# Why should you Teach Independence with your Child?

In the Montessori classroom, students are not viewed as a group. Instead, each child is viewed as an individual with unique learning needs. This view of students makes independence an important factor in Montessori education. The teacher looks at each student as an individual and plans accordingly.

### Reasons Independence matters:

- When children are allowed to do tasks on their own, they build confidence in their abilities. It boosts their self-esteem and makes them believe in themselves.
- They develop life skills. They learn to be responsible, make decisions, solve problems and become self-sufficient.
- Motivation and internal drive: Montessori classrooms encourage children to set their own goals and choose their activities. This fosters intrinsic motivation, where the child is driven by the joy of learning itself.
- It fosters decision making. It allows children to use critical thinking to make decisions and to take responsibility for their choices.
- It encourages responsibility. The students learn how their actions affect others and to be a contributing member of the classroom or the family.
- It empowers children to take initiative, be creative and build an adaptability to face challenges in life.
- Finally, it prepares them for adulthood. They learn valuable skills to help them in higher education and in their careers as a productive member of society.

#### How do we do that in the classroom?

We create a positive, free-flowing learning environment, emphasizing practical life activities, and fostering a sense of responsibility for the environment and world around them. This cultivates capable and confident students.

As parents, you can play a crucial role in supporting the development of independence and self-confidence in your child. There are several things you can do to assist your child's growth at home as well:

 Encourage Decision-Making: You should allow your child to make decisions at an age-appropriate level, such as choosing their clothes or choosing activities they will pursue. This fosters a sense of responsibility and autonomy, which nurtures their decision-making abilities.

- Promote Problem-Solving: Encourage your child to solve problems on their own. Rather than immediately
  intervening, guide them through the problem-solving process to boost their confidence and help them
  develop problem solving skills.
- Offer Opportunities for Independence: Whenever possible, give your child opportunities to practice
  independence, such as preparing their own snacks or tidying up their play area. Be patient and supportive
  as they develop their skills, as it is through practice that their self-confidence will develop.

As parents we want to prepare our children to be as successful as possible and to always be there for them. Sometimes that means stepping back, allowing them to struggle a bit. Although that may sound counterintuitive the results of being able to accomplish something on their own can be so rewarding especially for your child but also for you. To hear the words "I did it myself" can be the best words you can ever hear.

### PRE-K AND K 1 CLASSROOM NEWS

With the last couple of months of school upon us, we hope that the weather slowly improves and temperature increases so that we can all

enjoy being outside together. Watching the children now compared to when we started the school year has been such a joy.

The children really enjoyed Mr. Guys visit.

He brought instruments from Africa and Asia and the children were able to try them and dance around to the music they produced. Such a fun in house visitor!



Sensorial has become more interesting since we have been working with many extensions, which means using one or more of the sensorial materials together. Some of the works can become two person works; the children love to work with their friends.

In math the children have been progressing with complex numbers and doing the math operations if they are at this level. The younger children all seem to be mastering their recognition of numbers and working on placing the



correct number of objects with the number. As the month and season changes the work in this area changes so they are always interesting. Always practice counting and recognizing numbers in the real world with your child. Clocks and money have also been introduced.

In language some of the children are writing sentences and sounding out the words. The spelling is not always correct but the fact they are trying to hear the sounds is such a confidence builder. The younger children are exposed to beginning, ending and middle sounds on

a regular basis in many different ways. This can take time and as I tell the children it is not a race, once they get them and remember them, they can move to the next level. This happens at all different ages and only when the child is ready. A lot of development has to take place to get the child ready. For example, a child needs to be able


to dress themself and use the bathroom independently before we can expect them to read fluently. Please make sure there are plenty of books available for summer reading. It's so important to read to your child daily. Cut down on the electronics and read books.



The children love the **practical life** area working with pouring, tonging, and many other different hand manipulatives. We introduced sewing and it was amazing to see how many of the children found this to be so relaxing. They just loved it! We will continue sewing until the end of the year.

In science we have planted the hyacinth

bulbs outdoors that grew indoors. We hope to see them blooming next spring. We have also planted some seeds; it will be fun to watch them sprout. We have also been talking about the life cycle of animals. They especially



enjoyed the frogs. We will also watch the lifecycle of the butterfly during the next couple of months. In geography we will continue with continents and showing the children where they are on the map.

We talked about recycling on Earth Day and used re-cycled items to make a craft of their choice. They really enjoyed using their imagination.

outside...Run children run...work off that energy that has been pent up.


This is also the time to prepare to say goodbye to our kindergarteners. This year we were unfortunate to not have any kindergarteners in our class but we wish the kindergarteners in other classes a fond farewell. They are a special group of children that have shown great academic success and are role models of leadership.

We look forward to an enjoyable Spring Concert. All the children have worked very hard practicing and are excited to show you, their songs.

Science is alive in our classroom. We are very excited to have life cycles in progress in our classroom. We currently have butterfly larvae that are growing quickly and soon will spin a chrysalis. Along with that we have 5 chicken eggs

incubating with the anticipation of baby chicks.

The children thoroughly enjoy the process and the excitement of the first pip, and the cracking open of the egg. They will learn the care of the animals, what the body parts

April, we talked about how we are the visitors to the Earth and how we need to care for our animal and plant sisters and brothers.

In Geography we like to round out the year by learning about the United States. The children will learn the names of the states and their locations along with regions, climates and some topography. We will identify the parts of the

United States Flag and many others of the world. We will finally focus on Michigan and then will identify our home towns along with our home addresses.

In **Practical Life** we continue to have fun bed making, proper hand washing and table scrubbing, sweeping and caring for our environment. We are learning to organize our school work and be neat with all our belongings.



In Sensorial we will be using different materials to make some extensions of our sensorial materials. The children will be using a listening center to hear stories.



In Math we

are working with all the students to strengthen their skills, playing memory games and being a banker. We are practicing math facts, math terminology of greater than and lesser than, counting backwards and skip counting. We have been practicing our telephone numbers so the children have an emergency number learned.

We are very proud of all the readers we have in our class. The students have worked so hard and enjoy reading and hearing stories. A few minutes of daily practice at home is the best way for the mechanics of reading to get easier for your child. The enjoyment of reading comes from listening to a great

story. Please read regularly to your

child.

We continue to have daily practice in Writing. It can be letter or number formation practice or proper sentence writing. We are learning to check and correct our own mistakes before showing the teacher. Many are using the "Writing Without Tears" program to practice proper formations. The older children are practicing creating their own sentences. Some of the children are learning parts of speech and the difference between a question and a statement.

Many will be journal writing and story writing.



We will be very sad but will fondly miss the students that move on to new schools. Please remember no matter what school they go to there will be an adjustment period to new expectations and routines. Although they did not finish the Montessori Journey, we know that they are very prepared at the level they are leaving us. We wish you the best.

We are sad to say goodbye to our kindergarteners, Elizabeth and Leo. It has been a pleasure to work with you. You are prepared for first grade and to start your next educational journey. We will really miss you, but we know you will be very successful in everything you do. There are a group of eager children just waiting to fill your shoes and

become kindergartners next year.

The children are enjoying learning and practicing the songs for the Spring Concert. We are so proud of them. We can't wait to be able to perform for everyone. In Language, the children continue to progress at their own pace through the language materials. We have many readers who are at many different levels of reading. We have some who are just starting to read and some who are at the

higher level of our reading series. The older children have started journal writing. We have many new readers and many who are very close to reading. Whenever your child reads to



you, please be their biggest cheerleader. Enjoy the story with them and realize how hard they are working to become a reader. For the last time this year, I continue to ask you to please read daily to your child. Story reading is a warm and cuddly time for you to spend with your child. It increases their concentration as well as language development, and gives them a purpose to learning sounds so that they become interested in reading.

Even after your child is reading, please continue to read to them on a daily basis. It is so important to make that part of your daily routine.



In Math we have been learning about clocks and how to tell time on analog clocks. We have started learning about money. The children will be learning the value of money as well as sorting, matching,


and

identifying coins and currency. We will soon move to our unit on fractions. We are practicing counting by 10's, 5's, and are introducing counting by 2's.



In **Science** we will be very busy. We have begun our unit on Botany. The children planted marigold seeds and are taking care of their plants. They are really enjoying watching their plants

grow. We have started our unit on butterflies. We are watching our caterpillar larvae eat and grow bigger. We are waiting, with great anticipation, for them to spin their chrysalises and emerge as

We will be assigning each child a different date so that we don't have more than one birthday celebration at a time. With the crazy Michigan weather, please make sure to check the weather each morning and dress your child accordingly. We seem to be experiencing cold weather one day and hot weather the next. We do take our water bottles out to the playground on warm day to keep the children hydrated.

## Actor Robin Williams once quoted "Spring is nature's way of saying, let's have a party!"

The weather has its moments, but all in all it's been warm enough outside to enjoy the fresh

air, and sunshine!

Practical Life: In the toddler room we are having fun washing toys, rocks, tables and chairs, sorting assorted objects, learning to pour water without spilling, peeling fruits and lots of arts and crafts. In the self-care area, the children are learning to put on their own jackets and shoes along with blowing their noses, sneezing into the elbow and washing their own face and hands

after eating. By practicing this, we are helping the child to feel a sense of accomplishment, this builds self-confidence by completing a task on their own.

Language: We have been working on our beginning sounds and articulation in speech. Along with reading and working on "Opposites" we are also working on our writing skills, practicing proper pencil grasp. We are tracing and forming proper strokes such as horizontal, vertical and diagonal. We also are practicing writing skills on the easel or sensorially with the rice tray. The children have

been learning about the different kinds of birds and insects using books, flashcards and posters. We have had a lot of fun using wild Audubon stuffed birds that play that specific bird call when squeezed.



Sensorial: The children had fun blending paint colors by taking two primary colors to create a secondary color. We also are working with geometric solids using three dimensional materials along with



flash cards. The favored shape seems to be the "cone" because it looks like an upside-down ice

cream cone! We will also continue working

with visual discrimination, creating patterns and working with complex more puzzle work.



Math: As we continue counting as a group using the calendar, the children have gotten very good at counting past 20. We also have been learning about the different days and seasons along with the

weather. We also using

flashcards and books instill number recognition along with one-to-one correspondence which assigning number to each object

once.



During these last months of the school year, we will be learning the life cycle of the butterfly. We have adopted 5 caterpillars and will be watching them closely as they display the four stages of development. Once they change into beautiful butterflies, we will release them outside!



Our social/emotional goals we are striving to reach in our classroom by the end of the year are self-regulation, cooperation, self-evaluation, ability to lead & follow, development of social perspectives, self-direction, confidence enthusiasm for learning! It has been a joy watching

each child grow and express their unique individuality!! Thank you to all the parents who have supplied us wonderful snack
